Our Curriculum

At King Edward VI King's Norton School for Boys, we have designed our curriculum with our students' learning at the centre.

We have devised an ambitious curriculum that provides a broad and balanced education for all our students, and it has been designed to give all learners the knowledge and cultural capital they need to succeed in life, both academically and personally.

Our school motto, Humani Semper Contendimus -'we humans are always striving' - drives us in providing the best quality education for our boys, as does the understanding that 'we are all learners'.

We are proud of the opportunities available to students at KNBS and we offer our students a wide range of new and exciting experiences in the classroom, form room and through extra-curricular activities that are designed to build Self-Discipline, Teamwork, Resilience, Initiative, Vision and Endeavour. These are our core STRIVE values.



We believe that the most effective way of preparing our students for our rapidly changing world is to provide them with a holistic education, covering a wide range of disciplines and subjects. Our curriculum ensures that students follow a rigorous pathway that is balanced between traditional academic subjects and the more creative, practical subjects. Our provision at each Key Stage ensures that students are fully prepared for the next stage of their education and lives.

The curriculum is coherently planned and sequenced to facilitate the accumulation of sufficient knowledge and skills for future learning and employment, and it offers them excellent opportunities to develop as individuals, as well as learners. Our Curriculum Leaders regularly review and adapt their sequencing of lessons to ensure that students are appropriately supported and challenged.



Our Curriculum Provision

The KS3 curriculum offers a variety of subjects and learning opportunities to deepen students' educational experience and build a solid foundation of subject knowledge and skills.

Students study a full range of academic and creative subjects. English, maths and science are given a prominent share of curriculum time, with humanities and languages also studied by all. Computer science, RE, music, art, technology (including food) and drama add further variety and challenge, and with two hours of active PE per week, boys have a rich, healthy and varied diet. Personal development is integral in many curriculum areas at times throughout the year and is also delivered in a dedicated lesson for one hour per week for Years 7 and 8, and within the carousel for Year 9 where we aim to prepare our students for life in a diverse, modern Britain. Our KS4 pathways are tailored and structured to meet the specific needs of our students who continue to study the core curriculum subjects, but also four option subjects from the beginning of Year 10. Students and their parents are supported during the options process in Year 9 via a dedicated options evening and a parents' consultation evening, with our options structured to allow students free choice. Subjects offered continue the philosophy of providing a rigorous and meaningful curriculum for our students. A good proportion of boys study the full suite of EBacc subjects, and all vocational courses feature on the DfE list of approved qualifications. This ensures that students leave KNSB with qualifications that will serve them well as they embark upon their next steps.

Students continue to enjoy regular active PE, assemblies and a weekly personal development programme that continues to contribute to student well-being and help them prepare for their next steps in life as they mature.

Our Personal Development Programme

King Edward VI King's Norton School for Boys has a long history of outdoor education, which to this day is still a popular addition to the students' school lives.

While the wide range of activities on offer continues to grow, the impact remains the same, enriching students' lives and inspiring young people to achieve at the very highest level. Engaging in the wide spectrum of experiences available provides opportunities for students to participate in new and exciting activities and to develop skills imperative for adulthood.

Outdoor education can be simply defined as experiential learning in, for or about the outdoors. The Institute for Outdoor Learning defines outdoor learning as a broad term that includes discovery of, experimentation with, learning about and connecting to the natural world, and engaging in environmental and adventure activities. Learning outside of a classroom involves

the transformation of knowledge, skills, attitudes or behaviours through direct engagement with the outdoor environment for the personal and social benefit of individuals, families, society and the planet.

To maximise the positive impact that outdoor experiences have upon students, the Outdoor Education Advisor's Panel have recommended that students should have access to frequent, continual and progressive experiences of outdoor learning. Over the last few years, there has been a growing body of evidence that supports the value of the 'outdoors' in terms of a students' development. Indeed, in Ofsted's 2008 report 'Learning outside the classroom: How far should you go?' they recognised that: 'When planned and implemented well, learning outside the classroom contributed significantly to raising standards and improving pupils' personal, social and emotional development'. This impact is a key reason why KNSB promotes such an inclusive outdoor education programme.
